The Search Committee is thrilled to announce that on September 21, 2008 you, the congregation, unanimously voted to call Reverend Christopher L. Dodge as our next Senior Pastor at First Parish. He will start on January 1, 2009 and will live in the parsonage.

Chris is a native of Brockton and grew up there in Christ Congregational Church UCC. His parents and grandmother still live in Brockton. He has one sister who is married to the pastor of the Trinitarian Congregational Church UCC in Norton and they have two daughters.

Chris is a 1997 graduate of Andover Newton Theological School, and among his accomplishments there, he was the choice of the faculty for the H. Otheman Smith Community Preaching Award at graduation.

## Practicing the Faith at Home

from "Celebrating the Home – Deborah Paydan (UCC Press – 1998)

**Worship** – Begin each week with Sunday worship at your church. Our faith is centered in the Christian community worshipping together. We are members of the Body of Christ, not isolated individuals or families. Find ways to participate in the life and ministries of your congregation.

**Keep Sabbath** – Sunday is the traditional weekly Sabbath time. Refrain from work and daily responsibilities. Play, experience creation, read, listen to music, etc. Enjoy one another's companionship. Seek other times of rest and relaxation as a family. These can be transforming, grace filled times for everyone.

**Pray** – Take intentional time to pray. Bedtime and meals are two traditional times of daily prayer. Pray during times of transition, holidays, and moments of crisis or celebration. Pray traditional prayers, or make up your own. Be silent together. Prayer is communicating with God.

**Celebrate** – Observe the church year. Celebrating Christian traditions and rituals shape our identity, help us mark time, and give meaning to life. Mark important times of personal or family transitions in life. Practice hospitality by inviting others to share in your celebration.

**Eat Together** – Eating meals together nourishes our spirits as well as our bodies. Make time to eat meals together during the week. Breaking bread in community invites opportunities for discussion about life's issues.

**Talk and listen-** Discuss what is going on in one another's lives. Listen to one another. Ask questions. Share ideas. Confront and discern together responses to difficult choices and situations. Be honest. Respect and honor everyone's thoughts, experiences and struggles.

**Tell stories** – Read and tell stories of faith. Read stories from the Bible. Learn about faithful people throughout history. Tell stories of family members. Witness to one another about your journeys of faith. Find stories in the contemporary world of those who struggle to live in God's way.

**Serve others** – Loving compassion, mercy, and generosity toward others is a central practice of discipleship. Find ways to serve and minister to others locally or globally. Giving you time, talent and treasure to the church is one important way to engage in this practice.

**Forgive one another** – Jesus' ministry was grounded in forgiveness and reconciliation. Patterns and skills of how to forgive and be reconciled to one another are learned early. Open and honest communication is needed to address hurts, discerning appropriate redress, asking, receiving and accepting forgiveness.

**Grow spiritually** – Adults need to take time to attend to their own spirituality and growth in faith. Read the Bible, pray, and participate in adult faith formation opportunities in your church. Mature faith takes a lifetime to grow. The best way for children to grow in faith is for adults to grow in theirs.

## 2008-2009 Church School

What a great way to launch the year! Having pushed back the opening of church school to accommodate the Candidating Sunday of Rev. Christopher Dodge, we are starting the program year knowing we can look forward to an exciting year of new beginnings.

In the Church School at First Parish we introduce the people and stories of the Old and New Testaments in a nurturing and accepting setting. We encourage children to explore the stories and to find their own connections with God through these narratives. We welcome all children. Volunteer leaders teach Sunday morning Church School for children in Pre-

school through Grade 8 using the *Godly Play* (PS-2) and *Living the Good News* (3-8) curriculums, which include Bible stories, learning projects, and music. Parents are encouraged to visit the classrooms and see what happens first hand. The children are empowered to choose mission programs to support with their own offerings. Past recipients have included the Heifer Project, Walk for Hunger, Animal Rescue League, Westwood Community Chest, and many others.

This year the Ministries of Education and Worship have adopted a different approach to Intergenerational Sundays. They are no longer being held on long school weekends. Parents have requested that children be able to attend more worship services when communion is served and in which they can participate. For that reason, we offer this new take on an old concept:

**2008-2009 Calendar:** On the calendar below Church school classes are held on all weeks not listed, and some that are. The exceptions to regular classes being held are generally those dates when we have special events or only part of the church school has class.

**Intergenerational Worship:** Families of all ages gather to worship together on these Sundays. Children and families are invited to help lead these services. Anyone interested in participating may contact Maureen Sullivan of Education, Jim McKenzie of Worship or Donna Bertazzoni, Church School Administrator. Church School is not scheduled on intergenerational Sundays; however, the Nursery is available for children through age 5.

**K-8 Group Adventures** Occasionally, the children of the church school meet as a single group for a multi-age lesson in the Parish Hall. Sunday School takes place at the regular time on these weeks. The Nursery is available for children through age 5.

**Church School Registration** Parents are welcome to enroll their children in Church School classes at any time. You may bring your children to church on Sunday morning and enroll them with the Education office (me), or link to our Registration Form on the main page of the church website, [www.firstparishwestwood.org](http://www.firstparishwestwood.org) and bring it with you. Please register your children before sending them to class. Visitors are always welcome. Just introduce yourself and your child to the classroom teacher and fill out our visitor form.

**Playground** We share the playground with our tenant Clapboardtree Nursery School. The equipment is designed for little ones. Parents are expected to supervise their children and return everything to normal when done, including covering the sandbox and closing the gates. Thank you for your cooperation.

**Still Needed** Additional Teachers are needed for the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> Grade class. Creative scheduling is possible. If you are interested in this vital ministry, please contact me.

Although this topic is not one that we like to think about, it is a topic that comes up in our schools every year and can occur in any setting. Thus I felt I would share the facts about this common phenomenon medically known as pediculosis. This information comes from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health.

### What are lice?

Lice (singular *louse*) are tiny, wingless insects that survive by feeding on human blood. They cannot jump or fly, and they do not burrow under the skin. Head lice are the most common type of lice and live mainly on the scalp, at the base of the neck, and in the eyebrows and eyelashes. They lay up to six eggs per day, attaching the eggs (called nits) to strands of hair close to the scalp.

In the United States, children (3 to 12 years old) get head lice more frequently than adults. **Anyone can get head lice because they are easily spread from person to person.** Having lice is referred to as an “infestation.” An infestation with head lice does not mean someone is dirty.

Head lice are spread through direct, person-to-person contact or, less commonly, through contact with an infested person’s personal items, such as hair brushes and combs, hats, unwashed clothing, bedding or towels. Head lice are commonly spread within households. Children often spread head lice to each other during close contact while playing..

A person who has head lice may feel itching, but many children have no symptoms. Head lice are not known to spread infectious diseases from person to person and should not be thought of as a medical problem. However, there is some risk of skin infection from too much scratching. Head lice are certainly a nuisance, but they are not generally considered a health hazard. Nits are tiny, grey, oval specks that do not come off of the hair easily like a speck of dandruff would

Children should be checked regularly and treated when head lice are found. Parents should learn to recognize head lice and, as an extra precaution, teach their children not to share hats and scarves or personal hair care items, such as brushes, combs and hair ties.

Treatment for head lice consists of shampooing the hair with a medicated shampoo or cream rinse containing one of the following chemicals: *pyrethrin*, *permethrin*, *lindane* or *malathion*. The chemicals used to kill the head lice and their nits may be toxic and should be used with care, under the supervision of a health care provider (even though some of them do not need a prescription). Be sure to follow the package or label instructions very carefully. Removal of all nits after treatment with these chemicals is not necessary to prevent further spread, although some schools and daycare centers have “no-nits” policies (see below). Check the hair daily for the next 10 days for more nits or newly hatched head lice. If these are present, an additional treatment may be necessary.

Women who are pregnant or nursing, and parents concerned about an infant with lice should contact a healthcare provider before using these chemicals.

### Additional precautions:

Remember, head lice do not survive for long periods of time off of the scalp. The following steps should be taken to avoid reinfestation by lice that have *recently* fallen off of the head of an infested person.

- 1 Wash headgear, pillow cases, and towels in the washing machine in hot water and dry them in a machine dryer on the hot cycle.

- 2 Any items that cannot be washed should be sealed in a plastic bag for 2 weeks. This leads to the death of any lice in these objects.
- 3 Combs and brushes can be washed with one of the lice-killing shampoos or soaked in **hot** (128.3°F/53.5°C) water for 5 minutes. This should kill any lice on these items.
- 4 Thoroughly vacuum rugs, upholstered furniture, and mattresses.
- 5 **DO NOT USE INSECTICIDE SPRAYS TO TREAT INFESTED PEOPLE.** These chemicals can be harmful to both people and pets.

Reinfestation occurs with some regularity and can be frustrating for parents, teachers and children. Treating reinfested and newly infested cases at the same time may help to stop the cycle.

Many school departments and child care sites require that children be free of nits before returning to school. These policies vary from school to school, and parents should be familiar with their own school's or day care's head lice policy. The American Academy of Pediatrics does not recommend "no nits" policies because they have not been shown to be effective in controlling head lice transmission.
