HUNGER BANQUET

March 27th at 5 PM in the Parish Hall

On Sunday, March 27th at 5:30PM First Parish will host a Hunger Banquet in the Parish Hall. The event is being run by the high school youth of First Parish, First Baptist and St. John's churches, and is open to the whole Westwood community. Few experiences bring to life the inequalities in our world more powerfully than an Oxfam America *Hunger Banquet* event. Unique and memorable, the Oxfam America *Hunger Banquet* event allows participants to experience firsthand how our decisions affect others in the world.

Here's how it works: Guests draw tickets at random that assign them each to a high, middle, or low-income economic tier, based on the latest statistics about the number of people living in poverty throughout the world. Each income level receives a corresponding meal.

The 15 percent in the high-income tier

are served a sumptuous meal; the 35 percent in the middle-income section eat a simple meal of rice and beans; and the 50 percent in the low-income tier help themselves to small portions of rice and water.

Guests can also assume characterizations that describe the situation of a specific person at the income level to which they've been assigned. Finally, all guests are invited to share their thoughts after the meal and to take action to fight poverty.

After an Oxfam America *Hunger Banquet* event, few participants leave with full stomachs, but all possess a greater understanding of the problems of hunger and poverty and will hopefully be motivated to do something about them.

Admission is \$10 per family, and \$5 per individual. Donations received will support hunger relief through Oxfam America.

WHO'S WHO AT FIRST PARISH

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FROM PASTOR CHRIS



In the season of Lent we often hear about the practice of fasting. This ancient practice helps us to remember that God is all we need to satisfy our “hungers” in life. Too often we act as if we cannot live without certain things like a kind of food, or TV or Facebook or texting. These become the things we rely upon to comfort us. But too often they consume us more than we think. We act as if we cannot live without them when all we truly need to live is God. So fasting for 40 days is one way of having think about how and where in our lives we might be off track or consumed by things that steal ourselves and our resources from God or family or friends or those in need.

We also hear about the practice of giving during Lent. It could mean many things from giving time to volunteer somewhere to reading a devotional book. “Giving up” and “taking on” are both disciplines that help us reflect upon our relationship with God. I encourage you to consider doing at least one on these things for your Lent, if not both!

Ponder this offering about “giving” that is adapted from *Stages on the Way*
(1997, Wild Goose Resource Group, Iona Community)

What can you give to the Lord?

I am giving you me, Lord.

I am giving you me in the twinkle of my eye and the sadness of my sighing; in the laughter of my heart and the tears of my soul; in the rhythms of my feet and the silence of my listening.

I am giving you me in the promises I keep and the insults that I pardon; in the good news that I share and the confidence that I protect; in the remembering of gracious things and the forgetting of forgiven sins.

I am giving you me in the young one I kneel beside and the old ones I sit with; in the unborn ones I pray for and the dying ones I pray with; in the bright ones I wave to and the hurting one I touch.

I am giving you me in the meant song, in the quiet pause, in the special moment, in the nod of my life to your will and still, I am giving you me in the stuttered prayer and the lingering doubt and the dry days of the spirit and the contradicted hopes.

I am giving you me, Lord.

What does the Lord give to you?

I am giving you me, my brothers and sisters. I am giving you me in the beauty of the earth and the ugliness of the wooden cross; in the fullness of four seasons and the emptiness of a garden tomb; in the warmth of the weak and the rejection of the mighty; in the company of God’s people and the solitude of a place apart; and sometimes, when a stone wall confronts you, I am giving you me, praying on the other side: Father, may the love you have for me be in them, so that I may also be in them and they in us.

PLEASE JOIN US IN A LENTEN FAST . . . FROM CARBON

As we write this invitation, the World Meteorological Organization, along with NOAA and NASA, all have data showing 2010 tied with 2005 for being the hottest year on record. We also read that in December 2010, Arctic sea-ice cover was the lowest on record. Just as humanity now recognizes climate change as a predominant scientific, economic and political issue, we also realize it is a profound moral issue. Life on earth as we know it is mortal – it is susceptible to change, hurt and, yes, death.

Ash Wednesday (March 9, 2011) invites us into the season of Lent – a time within the church year to acknowledge that we are mortal, limited. Lent awakens us to hope in God whose "steadfast love endures forever" and to struggle against everything that leads us away

from the love of God and neighbor. The Lenten disciplines of repentance, fasting, prayer, study and works of love are guides for returning to the steadfast love of God. During Lent we confess our mortality, our limits and our vulnerability so that we might be transformed and become the new life God calls us to be.

We invite you to join us as we commit to fasting from carbon during Lent.

Beginning Ash Wednesday and throughout Lent, participants will receive a daily email with the day's suggested carbon-reducing activity. When possible, this will include a quantitative measure of the carbon reduction resulting from the activity. Each daily email will also have a section suggesting a weekly focus for the congregation.

This invitation is being emailed to pastors all over the country by UCC Conference Ministers and by our counterparts in numerous denominations. In this way we will make this Ecumenical Lenten Carbon Fast a broadly experienced ecumenical spiritual practice. Our hope is that Christians the world over from every denomination might participate in this carbon fast.

Congregations that participate are encouraged to gather weekly to share their experiences, support one another, compare notes, share resources and pray.

God is calling us to be the change we long to see. Let us engage this spiritual discipline, grateful for all God has entrusted to us, and trusting that with God all things are possible.

IT'S A GIFT

Not long ago a father told me of a Sunday morning conversation he'd had with his children. It went something like this:

Dad (with enthusiasm): Hey, kids. There are no sports scheduled for this morning! Let's go to church.

Children (puzzled): Why?

Dad (chagrined pause): That's why.

Maybe you've had this debate in your house. Maybe you've had it more than once. Maybe you have a variation of it every single week.

Bringing children to church can be complicated. Motivations and obstacles contend for our time and values. Sometimes it's about inertia. Just how much energy does it take to break the bonds between a child and his or her bed (couch, cell phone, X-box, family room floor...)? Sometimes it's a question of logistics. It can feel overwhelming to coordinate the children in a family to all be dressed and ready to go at once for the seventh time in a week. For others it's a matter of philosophical relativity. How much friction exists in a family concerning the value of going to church? And, of course, this is a society of endlessly competing choices. How many activities are vying for *your* coveted Sunday morning window of opportunity? But when your children can't think of a single reason to go to church, why make the effort?

What is unique for you about what happens at church? What is worth getting your household out the door? What can be found at church that is unavailable anywhere else? How does your relationship with God reflect what you want for your children? Each of us answers these questions somewhat differently. When you think about your Sunday morning choices, consider:

The grace of God means something like: Here is your life. You might never have been, but you are because the party wouldn't have been complete without you. Here is the world. Beautiful and terrible things will happen. Don't be afraid. I am with you. Nothing can ever separate us. It's for you I created the universe. I love you. There's only one catch. Like any other gift, the gift of grace can be yours only if you'll reach out and take it. Maybe being able to reach out and take it is a gift too. - Frederick Buechner Wishful Thinking

The grace of God is a gift. To reach out and take it requires effort.

Although February was Heart Health Month, it is never too late to talk about heart health.

What is Heart Disease

Heart disease is the leading cause of death in the nation. The largest cause of heart disease deaths is coronary heart disease and is caused by not enough blood supply to the heart and the tissue around the heart. Coronary heart disease usually results in a heart attack. It can often be prevented with changes in health habits such as not smoking, better eating habits and more exercise. Risk factors such as high cholesterol, diabetes and high blood pressure may be controlled with the right medications and lifestyle changes.

Five Strategies you can adopt to prevent heart disease

1. Don't smoke or use tobacco products

No amount of smoking is safe. Smokeless tobacco and low-tar and low-nicotine cigarettes are also risky as is exposure to secondhand smoke. The good news is that when you quit smoking your risk of having a heart attack or stroke drops dramatically within a year.

2. Exercise, exercise, exercise

Regularly doing moderately vigorous exercise can reduce risk of fatal heart disease by almost a quarter.

3. Eat a heart-health diet

Consistently eating a diet rich in fruits, vegetables, whole grains and low fat dairy products can protect your heart.

4. Maintain a healthy weight

As you gain weight you gain more fatty tissue. This excess weight can lead to conditions that increase your chances of heart disease, high cholesterol, high blood pressure and diabetes.

5. Get regular health screenings

- Blood pressure screenings start in childhood. Adults should have their blood pressure checked at least every two years. Optimal blood pressure is less than 120/80 millimeters of mercury.
- Cholesterol levels for adults should be measured at least once every five years. Some children may need theirs tested.

Note: These are maximum time ranges for testing for people who are in optimum health. Always follow your primary care providers recommendations.

Multiple Risk Factors for Cardiovascular Disease

The major risk factors that you can control for cardiovascular disease are:

Smoking
Physical inactivity
Diabetes
Excess Weight
High blood pressure
High blood cholesterol

Nationally, of those with high blood pressure, 30% don't know they have it, only 34% have their blood pressure controlled, 25% are on medication but it is not controlled and 11% are not on medication. Heart disease is often preventable. Following a heart health lifestyle does not have to be complicated. Find ways to include heart healthy habits in YOUR lifestyle.
