Dear Members and Friends of First Parish,

This past year has been an exciting time in the life of First Parish! Under the new leadership of Pastor Chris Dodge and Bob Deininger, our church moderator, as well as support from other lay leaders, we are looking to conduct the pledge campaign for the 2010 ministry budget a little differently than in past years.

Since stewardship impacts each of our ministries, a delegate from each ministry team will be participating in the stewardship campaign, rather than stewardship being solely under the auspices of the ministry of Stewardship, Finance & Operations.

Furthermore, the lay leaders of the church see this as a great opportunity to find out what is on the mind of each member and friend of First Parish as we plan for the short term (2010) and the long term. It is for this primary reason that we will be visiting members and friends.

In the next few weeks, you will hear more about the theme of our stewardship campaign: "Giving Knows No Ending" during worship, and you will also be contacted by a visiting steward. They will ask to set up a meeting in your home or to invite you to a group meeting. The purpose of these meetings is as follows:

- To ask questions such as: What does First Parish mean to you? What are the things you value most about worship, mission & outreach, spiritual life & fellowship, discipleship & education? How can First Parish make its ministries of worship, fellowship, education and mission more meaningful to you?*
- To listen to your answers; and acknowledge any joys or concerns you have*
- To provide stewardship materials such as the narrative budget and pledge card; and request that you prayerfully consider your financial support of First Parish and its ministries*

The visiting stewards will arrange a follow up date and time to pick up your pledge card, or you can either mail it back to the church office or bring it to Stewardship Sunday on November 15. It is our hope that all pledge cards will be completed and received by Stewardship Sunday so we can dedicate our gifts before God and share some of the feedback.

We are excited to begin this important work, and thank you in advance for your openness to the visiting stewards and your generous support in sharing your time, talent, and treasure through First Parish.

“Giving Knows No Ending...”



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work.
(2 Corinthians 9:8)

These words are as true today as they were when they were written by Paul thousands of years ago. God’s giving is always about abundance. If we but take a moment to think about that truth, what lists we could write. God has given us many wonderful things, too numerous to mention – all that we need to have abundant life. God is a constant. God was with us yesterday, God is here with us today and God will be here with us tomorrow.

Knowing of the presence of God is a powerful thing. It makes me feel good to be loved by God. It helps me feel centered in my life. Here is your chance to give a gift that will help the hungry, sick and those living in abject poverty in the US and across the world. All of

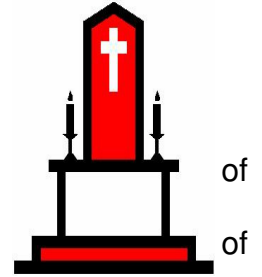

The Stress of the Long-distance Caregiver



From Our Parish Nurse

According to a study conducted by the National Alliance for Caregiving in collaboration with AARP, 15 percent of the estimated 34 million Americans who provide care to older family members can be considered long-distance caregivers, defined as living an hour or more away from their relative.

Living away from an aging parent can impact one's family life, finances and career, not to mention emotional well-being. It often requires caregivers to miss work to care for their relative, manage and supervise paid care providers from a distance and feel left out of decisions made by health care professionals or other family members who live closer.

What can be done?

1. *If you are the primary caregiver, identify someone you can trust to be your eyes and ears when you are not available.* This could be a trusted neighbor or friend, or hiring a licensed home health care agency. Professional home care services can range from non-medical care (companionship, shopping cleaning, etc.) for several hours a week to live-in medical services (trained home health aide) depending on the situation. Any agency being considered should include 24/7 on-call availability.

2. *Find senior resources located near the loved one to identify available programs.* These may range from Meals on Wheels to adult daycare programs. Begin the process by contacting the local Council on Aging.

3. *Make a list of prescriptions and over the counter medications including doses and schedules.* With many elderly people taking an average of six different prescription drugs and three or four over-the-counter products, they can be at risk for adverse interactions. This list should be provided both to the individual and the caregiver who sees them regularly. If feasible, either make a "medication sheet" that lists all medications and the time of each dose that can be checked off when the drug is taken, or pre-fill weekly pillboxes for the person. Either way helps to cut down on missed or duplicate doses.

4. *Make your visits count by looking for possible safety hazards in the relative's home.* Look for accidents waiting to happen. This may include such problems as loose rugs, poor lighting, faulty steps and unsafe clutter. It may also be time to install safety measures such as grab bars in the shower or a higher toilet seat. Rearrange the kitchen for easier access to dishes and pots and pans that are used on a regular basis.

5. *Work with your parent to create an advance directive stating his or her health care treatment preferences.* This written document can help family members avoid conflicts that can occur should there be any disagreement over treatment decisions. It should include naming a surrogate decision maker (with the authority to make decisions should the individual become incapacitated and unable to make them), acceptable treatment options and steps to consider in the case of an emergency. This document, which can be changed over time, would be placed in the medical record and made available to all family and healthcare caregivers.

6. *Consider the use of a Personal Emergency Response System.* This provides the loved one with a pendant, to be worn at all times, that will trigger a call to an emergency vehicle and the caregiver should he or she fall or become ill.

These are just a few ideas that may be helpful in caring for a loved one at a distance. Some apply to

both near and far care-giving and I will add one more – **Pray daily for God’s guidance in doing what is best for your parent.** Getting old or caring for our elders is not for “sissies.” We need to be caring of each other as well as caring for.

A Healthy Dessert for Thanksgiving Pumpkin Mousse Pie

(Makes 8 servings)
Prep. Time: 20 minutes
Cooking Time: 1 minute
Chilling Time: 1-2 hours

15 oz can pumpkin
¼ cup sugar or Splenda
1¼ pumpkin pie spice
½ tsp. vanilla extract
¼ cup water
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
2½ cups fat-free frozen whipped topping, thawed, *divided*
6-oz. reduced-fat graham cracker crust
pumpkin pie spice for garnish, *optional*

1. Combine pumpkin, sugar, 1¼ tsp. pumpkin pie spice, and vanilla in large bowl. Beat with whisk until blended. Set aside.
2. Place water in small saucepan. Sprinkle gelatin over top. Let stand until gelatin softens, about 1 minute.
3. Place saucepan over low heat and cook, stirring continually, until gelatin completely dissolves, about 1 minute.
4. Gradually pour dissolved gelatin mixture into pumpkin mixture, beating with whisk until blended.
5. Gently fold 2 cups of thawed whipped topping into pumpkin mixture.
6. Spread filling in graham cracker crust. Refrigerate until firm.
7. Fill pastry bag with remaining whipped topping. Decoratively pipe over filling or simply drop dollops of remaining topping over pie.
8. Garnish with a few sprinkles of pumpkin pie spice.
