This Sunday, March 14, is the **Fourth Sunday** in Lent. A colleague, Anthony Robinson, wrote this reflection on our text for Sunday, Numbers 21:4-9: . . . Then the Lord sent poisonous snakes among the people, and they bit the people, so many Israelites died. The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lord to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and



live." So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever the serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

Sometimes we go to great lengths to avoid actually looking at what is causing pain, even death, in our own lives and communities.

Why? Is it because if we look at the problem head-on, chances are good that we will have to deal with it?

On their wilderness journey, the Hebrew people complained long and loud about their situation. They accused Moses of bringing them out of slavery in Egypt only to kill them in the wilderness. Their lack of faith led to an invasion of poisonous snakes.

Moses received a strange instruction from God. "Make a serpent of bronze and put it on a pole. If people are bitten, they are to look at the bronze serpent and they will be healed."

They were to look at the source of the pain and death.

Lent is a good time to come clean about the things that are the real sources of pain and death in our lives and relationships, and to ask God's help to be delivered from them. Grudges we carry and refuse to release, addictions we don't admit, anger we've allowed to eat away at us, sin we have failed to own. We may point to, even treat, the symptoms—fatigue, irritability, deadness in relationships—but avoid looking at the source of the pain.

But when we look directly at the source of pain in our lives and take responsibility for action, a wondrous thing can happen. That source of pain may become a source of healing.

- Palm Sunday, March 28, Mark 11:1-11 Jerusalem was an occupied city. Its people were oppressed and needy. Jesus humble entry into Jerusalem is a sign that their salvation is coming through one who identifies with those who are oppressed and needy. The solitary individual on a donkey, leafy branches marking the way and shouts of "Hosanna" by the crowds is an intentional contrast to the powerful entrance one would expect from Imperial Rome a ruler on horseback, a military display of soldiers, the blowing of trumpets and crowds scurrying to get out of the way.
- **Easter Sunday, April 4** There is only one place we can 'see' the Risen Jesus. The angel at the empty tomb told the women (and us), "He is going before you to Galilee." The gospel narrative closes with the women (and us) fleeing from this tomb with the question of whether, in the light of resurrection we will live by our faith or by our fear; we will follow the risen Jesus who is going before us.

Family Service Project Opportunity: Cradles to Crayons

This Lent our family wanted to find a way of practicing our faith through a family service project. We found an opportunity with Cradles to Crayons, a Boston-based organization that provides clothing to children and their families who need it, including families in homeless situations.



On Monday we picked up a large bag of clothing, which had been quarantined. Together, we sorted clothes by type and made sure they were of quality, getting them ready for the next step of creating packages for individual children. We returned the sorted bags for Cradles to Crayons the next Monday for them to quarantine before the next step. We found this to be a small but meaningful way that we could be helping hands for others, and for us to remember that we are all held by hands we do not see. As Ellis and Silas said:

- "It felt good to think about how they would feel when they received the cloths and to do something for other people." (Ellis)
- "It felt like doing a chore for God and I was happy afterwards." (Silas)

Learn More About Westwood's Proposed Elementary School Community Meeting Set for March 18

The Westwood School Committee is inviting residents to a virtual community meeting on Thursday, March 18, at 7:00pm, to learn all the details of the town's proposed new elementary school and how it's being funded.

"This project not only consolidates two of our five elementary schools, but will also provide a lot of community-wide benefits to the town," said Maya Plotkin, member of the School Committee and chair of the School Building Committee (SBC). "It's really important to be informed about this project because it will impact everyone."

The project, estimated to cost \$87 million, proposes to combine elementary students from the Hanlon and Deerfield districts. It would be located on the site of the current Hanlon School.

In April, the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) will review the town's plans, the final step before voting to approve an \$18 million reimbursement to the town.

With the MSBA's participation, we can provide a new school for two districts in one building project. It's a huge economic opportunity for Westwood."

"Soup to Nuts" Presentation

At the community meeting, the School Committee will make a "soup to nuts" presentation, Plotkin said, examining deteriorating conditions at existing elementary schools, why the School Committee chose to consolidate Hanlon and Deerfield, why the SBC opted to build a new school rather than renovate, what the new building will look like, and how much it will cost.

"We'll also talk about the economic impact on the town," she added. "It will be the most comprehensive community forum we've had." Residents will have an opportunity to ask questions, too.

Hanlon and Deerfield Schools were built in the 1950s and, while they have been well maintained, they both have significant issues due to their aging infrastructure and design, according to Plotkin. In February, a ceiling collapsed inside a Hanlon classroom, requiring the closure of the school for two days to make the necessary repairs. Luckily, it happened before students and teachers arrived for the day.

Town Meeting Votes

In May, Town Meeting will vote on the SBC's request for \$1.46 million in bridge funding to allow the project's architects to move forward with their design work over the spring and summer. A special Town Meeting will be scheduled for the fall, at which time residents will vote on the entire project.

"By keeping the work going through the summer, we can break ground in July 2022, starting the outside site work in the middle of summer when the kids aren't there," Plotkin said. "Those are much better conditions in which to start a construction project."

If all goes as planned, the new school will open in Winter 2024.


